The gravestone of Joseph Cox, who died 11 Jan 1759

The arms at the top centre of this stone are those of the Carpenters' Company of London. However membership of that company was for people who plied their craft within the City of London. Enquiries of the company's clerk produced no evidence that Joseph had ever been a member. He would never have been entitled to use the company's arms.

The arms, and the tools which are shown beside them, represent Joseph's occupation as a carpenter. It is supposed that their use was a conceit by some descendant: perhaps by a descendant of Joseph's eldest son, Samuel, whose family were ornamental stone carvers in Northamptonshire.

It is thought that the stone may have been replaced or re-cut at some date. There are differences between its record in the Gentlemens' Magazine of June 1799, and this photograph taken in 1968. The magazine makes no mention of the arms of the Carpenters' Company. There are also minor variations in the wording of the inscription, and its capitalization and layout:

Also, ELIZABETH, his wife,
died March 15, 1762,
aged 101.
Their descendants, at her death,

Unresolved matters:

- the inscription states that Elizabeth died on 15 March 1762 yet the parish register shows her date of burial as 14 March 1762
- the inscription states that the couple had at least 62 grand-children: 51 are currently shown, or otherwise indicated, on the family tree 11 have yet to be traced
